We are pleased to present the 2021-22 Job Provider Index (JPI), the Michigan Chamber's biennial voting guide.

The Chamber's JPI tracks key legislative votes on top policy issues impacting job providers and the state's business climate. It breaks down the voting percentages of each Michigan lawmaker based on designated votes they cast on key legislation on which the Michigan Chamber clearly communicated its position prior to voting. Our commitment has been - and remains - focusing on pragmatic policy and problem solving.

This tool also serves as the basis for the Michigan Chamber's campaign endorsements of incumbent legislators. Any current legislator running for re-election to the same office who scores 75% or better on the Chamber's JPI is eligible for an "earned endorsement."

In encouraging news, 59 House and 21 Senate lawmakers from both sides of the aisle consistently cast their votes in support of jobs, taxpayers and economic growth. Of particular note, 18 of these House and Senate members went the extra mile with a perfect 100% on the Chamber's Scorecard, earning them the special designation as a "Champion of Free Enterprise."

2021-22 Key House Votes and Bill Descriptions

Appropriations

Deposit to Employer-Financed Unemployment Fund House Bill 5525 - Passage of a bill to make a \$100 million deposit into Michigan's 100% employer-financed Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund to hold employers harmless for the fraudulent benefits and improper payments the state paid out over the course of the pandemic. The Chamber supported this appropriation. The bill passed and was signed into law. *Roll Call Number 154*

Funding for COVID Relief and Economic Development Senate Bill 85 - Passage of a bill to provide financial relief grants to businesses disproportionately afflicted by the pandemic and funding to allow the state to put more effective economic development packages on the table to attract and retain companies. The Chamber supported this appropriation. The bill passed and was signed into law. *Roll Call Number 641*

Make Michigan More Competitive for Jobs and Investments
Senate Bill 771 - Passage of a bill to put the state in a stronger position to compete for, and win, transformational projects and grow economic opportunity in the state. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed and was signed into law.


Improve Michigan's Recycling Rate
House Bill 4454 - Passage of a bill to improve
solid waste management and diversion from
landfills. Michigan's recycling rate is one of the
worst in the nation and the bill is intended to
triple the state's recycling rate from 15 to 45%.
The Chamber supported this legislation. The
bill passed.

Health Care

Arbitrary Co-Pay Caps on Certain Prescription Drugs House Bill 4346 - Passage of a bill to set arbitrary co-pay limits on certain prescription drugs, which only shift costs around and lead to increased premiums, co-pays and/or coinsurance. The Chamber opposed this legislation. The bill passed. *Roll Call Number 73*

Human Resources

Ensure Background Checks Are Reliable
House Bill 5368 - Passage of a bill to ensure
employers and other businesses have the most
up-to-date and accurate information available
to them in background checks so they can
responsibly make employment, housing and
other decisions. The Chamber supported this
legislation. The bill passed.

Human Resources (Continued)

Search for Work as a Condition of Receiving Unemployment Senate Bill 501 - Passage of a bill to reinstate the requirement the state put on hold during the pandemic requiring individuals to register for work with a local Michigan Works! agency and search for work as a condition of receiving unemployment benefits. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed and was signed into law. *Roll Call Number 381*

Address Fraudulent Unemployment Benefits

House Bill 5528 - Passage of a bill to address the over \$8.5 billion the Michigan Unemployment Insurance Agency was found to have paid out in fraudulent and improper benefits over the course of the pandemic and ensure that these fraudulent benefits are not charged to employers. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed. *Roll Call Number 9*

Regulatory Reform

Waive COVID Fines if the Business Remedies

House Bill 4501 - Passage of a bill to specify the Michigan Occupational Health and Safety Administration (MIOSHA) cannot fine a business for its first health and safety violation so long as the business remedies the problem. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed but was vetoed. *Roll Call Number 237*

Tax Policy

Make COVID PPE More Affordable

House Bill 4224 - Passage of a bill to exempt COVID-19 personal protection equipment (PPE) and disinfecting supplies from state sales taxes in an effort to make PPE more affordable. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed but was vetoed. *Roll Call Number 297*

Ensure More Businesses Keep Their Hard-Earned Money House Bill 4288 - Passage of a bill to allow Michigan's pass-through entities to keep more of their hard-earned money by electing to pay an entity-level tax. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill was passed, vetoed and then re-introduced as HB 5376, which was ultimately signed into law.

Tax Relief for Small Businesses

House Bill 5351 - Passage of a bill to provide tax relief for small businesses through personal property tax (PPT) reform. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed and was signed into law.

Promote Tax Compliance and Efficiency

Senate Bill 248 - Passage of a bill to create a streamlined, predictable method for reporting changes in federal tax liability to state tax authorities. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed.

Eliminate Taxes on Certain Services

House Bill 5080 - Passage of a bill that exempts delivery and installation services from sales and use tax. The Chamber supported this legislation. The bill passed. *Roll Call Number 487*
